




Family History has a good Pedigree



How to start

- Start with yourself.
 - Document the vital statistics (dates, people, places) about your life.
- List the vital stats for your parents and grandparents.
- Creating a visual of your information can be helpful – a tree
- Organize yourself, documenting what you have found, where you have found it questions to follow up.




Gather Stories

- Gather information about your relatives. Learn about the area, context, and general history in which your ancestors lived to better understand.
- The tree is your starting point. Add some "meat" to the "bones."
- Document family lore and traditions.
- Maintain hard copies, don't only rely on electronic documentation.




Invest in some Tools


GRANDMA database

- Is a starting point
 - Helps create the tree and points to sources to track down.
 - Compilation of a community of Dutch/German/Russian Mennonite genealogists research. 1.46 million names and growing.
 - Genealogical Registry and Database of Mennonite Ancestry. (GRANDMA)
 - Purchase online \$20 for a 2 year subscription.
 - GRANDMA is for reference not for starting your own database.


